The Depot by the Numbers by Debbie Sherman

The Pullman Depot Heritage Center has finalized donation numbers for 2024. According to Steering Committee chair **Linda Hackbarth**, 137 donors have gifted \$305,893 to the Depot in the past year, with \$67,003 being earmarked for rail car restoration.

Building funds will support a new electrical and HVAC system, incorporating a new air flow system that will eliminate the old ductwork and thus preserve historic interior ceiling lines. The past year has seen



completion of the gutters and soffits, and the refurbishing and restoration of the window frames, along with the addition of a new security system.

Exterior restoration of the passenger car and caboose is a priority for 2025, the need for which can be seen in the photo at left. More than \$67,000 of the total raised to date has been earmarked for the two train cars. Additional pledges will add \$18,000. On completion of the work, a replica of the original "Cougar Special" platform—which will be fabricated by the McGregor Company—will be added.

February Palouse People: "Jennie Norton Bunker, Survivor of the 'Norton Massacre'"

Jennie Bunker, who—with her second husband Thomas Bunker—built a house in Pullman in 1892, is generally referred to as "a survivor of the Nez Perce War"—but she was really only involved in one incident. In mid-June of 1877, she had been shot through both legs during a two-day confrontation with Nez Perce (Niimiipuu) warriors while attempting to evacuate from Cottonwood House (now Cottonwood, Idaho). Crippled as a result, she was later interviewed repeatedly and she herself wrote extensively about her experience—until her death in 1928. Jill Gfeller of Thornton started volunteering at the Perkins House in Colfax five years ago. She was inspired to do so by a program presented by other Perkins House volunteers at a meeting of the Athenaeum Club. She now serves as a docent at the house, is working hard on its landscaping, and is the



museum's outreach coordinator (in charge of recruiting additional volunteers).

While leading tours of the house, Jill dresses in striking reproduction period clothing that she herself has made. "I've lost track of how many outfits I have," she admits. WCHS director **Val Gregory** says that Jill "always goes above and beyond to make the Perkins House a great place to visit."

Jill grew in Graham, Washington, and graduated from Eatonville High School. She then went to Washington State University, where she double majored in Agricultural Communications and Dance. In fact, she was the first to graduate in Ag. Com. and helped design the program. At WSU she also met her husband Steve, another Ag. major. The couple has three sons and eight grandchildren.

When asked why she devotes so much of her time to the Perkins House, Jill said, "I love history, and I love to dress up!"



FEATURED MUSEUM: THE TAUFEN SCHOOLHOUSE

102 J. Meyer Rd., Uniontown WA

The restored Taufen Schoolhouse (#134), a privately owned museum in southern Whitman County, is primarily the work of Barb Meyer, her late husband John, and their granddaughter Savannah Chadwick, although a number family members and hired men helped as well.

It was built in 1892 on land donated by Theordore Heitstuman, for whom it was originally named. By the time it closed in 1936, however, the name had been changed to Taufen Schoolhouse, to honor Lambert Taufen and his family, who were very active supporters of the school.

The building, which measures 20 by 30 feet, sat empty for several years. In 1949, John's father, Hubert "Shup" Meyer, moved it approximately 150 yards to its present location in order to make room to build a new house. It then served as small shop and as a shed for combine headers.

Beginning in 2012, Barb and Savannah spent four years researching, repairing, and furnishing the school, which they restored as closely as possible to its original appearance. The two sifted through old records, interviewed former students, and collected original items from the school—

as well as artifacts from other one-room schools in the area. It opened in September of 2014, although the interior was not completely finished for another two years.

The schoolhouse is free to the public but welcomes donations, which go to the Taufen Schoolhouse Scholarship Fund, awarded to a graduating Colton High School senior each year.
